

Signs of God's Love

The Book of Revelation is filled with symbols. The Scripture story you just read mentions the symbols of white robes, palm branches, and life-giving water. The white robes and palm branches symbolize the joy and victory God's faithful people will experience when they are united with him in Heaven. The life-giving water is a symbol of God's grace.

The Church also gives us symbols that remind us of God's love. These symbols are called **sacramentals**. Sacramentals help us draw closer to God and prepare us to receive the grace of the Sacraments.

Sacramentals include blessings, sacred objects, and sacred actions. Here are some examples.

Blessings Prayers of blessing for people, places, objects, and special activities

Sacred objects Bibles, crucifixes, rosaries, medals, holy water, holy oil, blessed ashes, blessed palms, blessed candles, church bells, statues, holy cards

Sacred actions The Sign of the Cross, the sprinkling of holy water, the anointing with oil, and the laying on of hands

Blessings are the most important kind of sacramental. God calls every baptized person to be a blessing in the world and he gives priests the sacred power to bless in his name.

Reminders of God's Grace

The Seven Sacraments were given to us by Jesus himself. Sacramentals are given to us by the Church. When a bishop, priest, or deacon blesses an object, it becomes a sacramental. Catholics should always use sacramentals in a holy and prayerful manner. They help us stay close to God and focus on his love and mercy.

Here are just a few of the sacramentals offered by the Church.

Holy Water Holy water is the most widely used sacramental. It is a reminder of our Baptism. When we enter or leave church, we dip our right hand into the holy water font and bless ourselves by making the Sign of the Cross.

Catholics can also use holy water to bless their homes, farms, businesses, and even their cars and pets.

Scapulars A scapular is two rectangular pieces of cloth attached to a cord that is worn around the neck. The pieces of cloth are usually decorated with images of the Virgin Mary.

The most famous scapular is the brown scapular worn by priests and nuns of the Carmelite Order. Many laypeople also wear the brown scapular. In the thirteenth century, the Virgin Mary appeared to Saint Simon Stock of England and told him that anyone who wore the brown scapular would receive her special protection. Wearing the brown scapular

is one way that Catholics can show their love and devotion to Our Lady.

Blessed Ashes On Ash Wednesday Catholics have their foreheads marked with blessed ashes. The ashes are a reminder of our need for repentance.





Church Bells Since the eighth century, churches, especially cathedrals, were expected to have bells that would ring whenever Mass was being celebrated.

The bells would also ring to announce the hours when priests and religious brothers and sisters prayed the Liturgy of the Hours. The Liturgy of the Hours is the official daily prayer of the Church. It is made up of psalms and other readings from the Bible.

Church bells are also rung to announce the election of a new pope. On March 13, 2013 church bells rang throughout Rome to announce the election of Pope Francis.

Our Church Teaches

Sacramentals call our attention to God's love and presence. They prepare us to receive the grace of the Sacraments and help us live holy lives.
